S THE SAINTS who were familiarized with many sufferings, and who gave evidence of their constancy unto death, were thereby rendered worthy of crowns of glory; and as the severer were their labours, the greater is the glory and the confidence which they now enjoy with God; so likewise, souls that are consigned to various afflictions, whether those afflictions appear to come from men, or arise from sinful and foolish thoughts, or are caused by bodily diseases, if they endure unto the end, will obtain the same crowns and the same confidence with the Martyrs. For, as these patiently endured the martyrdom which they suffered from men, so those souls, which shall have patiently sustained the martyrdom inflicted on them by the spirits of wickedness working within them, will hereafter receive glory from God according to the measure of the afflictions which they shall have endured from the adversary; and not hereafter only, but even here, being now accounted worthy to receive the consolation of the Good Spirit.
